



MYSTERY TRAIN

The tracks of four sets of lives intersect one Memphis night in a triff new Train of thought from cult director Jim Jarmusch.



FAGGED OUT: Pilgrims to the shrine of rock 'n' roll

Like the largely naff New York Stories, Mystery Train is an aggregate of three separately-titled tales.

Unlike the largely naff New York Stories, it's tales are brilliantly intertwined so that each forms part of a whole that's greater than their sum.

Deep down, the movie's about Elvis Presley. More superficially, it's about a point in place and time when the tracks of four sets of lives intersect.

This 'Clapham Junction' is a single night at a sleazy hotel in The,

King's home town of Memphis, Tennessee.

More specifically, it's the moment during that night when a single gunshot rings out, and for a fleeting instant, along with the all-pervasive Elvis influence, interlinks the lives of three sets of hotel guests, plus the place's nightclerk and bellboy.

There's a young Japanese couple who've come as pilgrims to the shrine of rock 'n' roll. She idolises Elvis, and will die happy once she's seen Graceland. He prefers Carl Perkins, and has the

legendary Sun Studios at the top of his must-see list.

Then, there's a widow who's forced to spend a night at the hotel while awaiting a flight home to Rome with her husband's remains. She rooms with a girl who's just broken up with her Britisher boyfriend, and who's set to leave town without even telling her brother, the local barber. During the night, the widow is visited by the ghost of Elvis.

Finally, there's the fleeing girl's boyfriend who, in a drunken rage, kills a liquor store owner, and lies low at the hotel with two friends,

one his girlfriend's brother.

Early in the morning, a single shot rings out. Everyone hears it. Meanwhile, mystery trains roll by, reflecting the fact that the film itself rides a network of rails — intersecting at a puzzle switch, changing routes, and passing from one life to another.

Brilliantly written and directed by Jim Jarmusch, maker previously of cult classics *Stranger Than Paradise* and *Down By Law, Mystery Train* represents quirky film-making at its most accessible and entertaining.

ERNEST SAVES CHRISTMAS

When Santa Claus finally reaches the retirement age of 150, he travels down from the North Pole to find a suitable replacement. But, finding it hard to convince people that he really is Chris Cringle, he enlists the aid of a pudding-headed cab driver called Ernest (played by Jim Varney) to help him out. Finally, they find the right chap to take over the job and save Christmas just in the Nick of time.

Ernest Saves Christmas could and should have provided festive fun and frolics for all the family. Unfortunately, it has all the excitement and charm of a soggy Christmas cracker. An embarrassment to sit through, it's a sequel of sorts to Ernest Goes to Camp (which made a fortune in the States, but which went straight to video here).

The sort of Yuletide romp that even a five-year-old would feel superior to, its plot could have been written on the back of a gift tag. And the jokes that do come off are so few and far between that it makes one wonder why the makers bothered in the first place.

Jim Varney, as the dim-witted Ernest, does his best to liven things up, but his continuous mugging quickly becomes a pain to watch (he does more in five minutes than Jerry Lewis has in an entire career). Douglas Seale makes a jolly enough Santa, though his replacement (Oliver Clark) doesn't exactly seem full of the Christmas spirit.

If the kids really insist on seeing this, I suggest you go shopping while they do so — it'll be less painful.

THE DREAM TEAM

Four mental patients go on a field trip to a football game but become separated from their therapist. Before recapture they get involved in a series of wild antics in the world's biggest lunatic asylum – New York City

From dubious unfunny beginnings, this admittedly obvious comedy generates into a riot halfway through and delivers some of the funniest moments on film so far this year.

Keaton and co play four New Jersey mental patients who lose their doctor and roam free in the Big Apple, getting mixed up in a plot involving murder and bent policemen. You know when the corrupt cops are on the screen because the music turns menacing (yawn!).

Keaton plays the rebel patient, fighting the system that keeps him locked up. It's ironic that the most aggressive member of this quartet also proves the sanest – a sad indictment on our society.

The underrated Peter Boyle is in excellent form as a man who believes he's Jesus.

And Christopher Lloyd is wonderfully subtle as Mr Meticulous and Tidy. The scene where he visits his family is a real heart-breaker.

And then there's the over-emphasized 'sympathy' character, the obese and silent Albert (Stephen Furst). Curiously, though, it's Boyle who receives my pity.

The only flaw is that, whilst at the hospital, these characters look like the simple stereotypes they indeed are, and their various

emotional defects seem exploited and stretched just for a few hit-and-miss gags. Only later in New York do they emerge as genuine, and therefore more funny.

However unoriginal the film and its cardboard story, it remains a delight, except for the shaky start. And there's a neat message hidden in it about how we treat and misunderstand the mentally ill.

Recommended, but it still could have been better.
